

Understanding Slang Money Terms & Vocabulary Extension Activity for Grade 4 Reads Presentation

Grade Level:

• Grade 4

Learning Objective:

This extension activity, along with the Grade 4 Reads presentation should help students:

- understand slang terms for money
- define words associated with money

Materials Needed:

- whiteboard
- whiteboard marker
- *Complete the Story* worksheet (1 per student)
- pencil (1 per student)

Lesson Plan:

- 1. Write the following words on the whiteboard before the lesson: slang words formal words
 - buck
 - bread
 - dough
 - loot

- buy
- paid
- savings
- spend
- bargain
- bank account
- miser
- cash
- savings plan
- 2. Ask students the following question: what is slang? Allow students to share their responses aloud and write correct responses on the whiteboard
- 3. Share with students the following definition of slang: <u>slang</u>: informal language specific to a certain group of people



- 4. Share with students some slang words can be found in the dictionary but they are not part of the formal English language
- 5. Read the words on the whiteboard aloud. Ask students if they have ever heard of any of these terms before. Students who participated in the *Grade 4 Reads* presentation will likely recognize these words from the story Rock, Brock, and the Savings Shock by Sheila Bair
- 6. Explain to students all the terms relate to money. Some of the words are slang and some are formal English words
- 7. Go through each term and ask students what they know about it. Write correct responses on the whiteboard
- 8. Share the following definitions with students:

buck	a slang word for one dollar. The term comes from the days when deerskins or	
	buckskins were commonly traded for goods	
bread	a slang word for money. The term comes from the days when earning a living	
	meant earning enough money to buy bread to feed your family	
dough	a slang word for money. The term is sometimes used instead of bread because	
	bread is made from dough	
loot	a slang word for money	
buy	to get something in exchange for money	
paid	to give someone money for work done or items received	
savings	money set aside to reach a financial goal	
spend	to pay money in exchange for goods or services	
bargain	a good or service bought or offered for less money than is expected	
bank account	a product offered by financial institutions where customers can put money in and	
	take out money and the financial institution keeps a record of this information	
miser	a person who spends as little money as possible	
cash	money in the form of bills and coins	
savings plan	a strategy for saving money where a person contributes money on a regular basis to	
	reach a monetary goal	

- 9. Distribute the *Complete the Story* worksheet and pencils to students
- 10. Review the answers with students after they have completed the worksheet
